One of the characteristics of little children is
that they

Love to ask questions.

Where are you going?

Are taking the bus?

When are you coming back?

Is Uncle going too? Ad infinitum.

Though they may not always get answers, this enquiring mind keeps them alert and brings on a certain level of awareness of their environment that is critical to learning. It is a pity that as adults most of us abandon the practice, for this awareness is not only critical to learning but charts the course of our purpose and hence our destiny.

Since questions are so critical to the path of our lives, we need to evaluate the kinds of questions we ask. We need to maximise the opportunities we have to ask. If someone says to you: "No one has ever asked me that question before." Pat yourself on the back.

You are doing something right as far as question asking is concerned. You are going somewhere. Learning is taking place.

Jesus Christ asked a lot of questions. He was constantly being questioned. He did not answer them all, but there is one declaration He made which seems to answer all questions: "I am the Truth." The truth is not a 'this is' statement, but an 'I am' statement. Ponder this: The focus of truth is relational it is a question of being. Knowing the truth is about having a relationship. Let's ask.
